However, it is now more appropriate to exclude the apostrophe (e.g., 1940s).</li> </ul>	<ul><li>I can't go to the party this weekend.</li><li>You shouldn't do that.</li></ul>

	<b>Note:</b> Except in direct quotations, exclamation points are not used in formal writing.			<b>Note:</b> Do not use ellipses either at the beginning or end of a direct quote.	with certain inalienable Rights" (Declaration).

Let's go to the pool."</li> <li>The researchers explained the results indicated "sugar is strongly correlated with risk of diabetes."</li> </ul>	Parentheses ( )	<ul> <li>✓ To include additional material that is not grammatically integral to the sentence</li> </ul>	• Shakespeare (who lived during the Renaissance) amazes me with his understanding of complex emotions.
	Note: When you are using a direct quote that contains <i>another</i> direct quote inside, the outside quote uses double quotation marks, and the inside quote uses single quotation marks. Example: The authors write, "Every dictionary of Ancient Greek includes paranoia, translating it as 'insanity,' 'madness.'"			<ul> <li>✓ To enclose in-text citations</li> </ul>	• Preparing to murder Duncan, Macbeth cries, "Is this a dagger I see before me?" (2.1.3)
				<ul> <li>✓ To set off items in a numbered or lettered series</li> </ul>	• Ariadne debated whether to concentrate her English major in (a) rhetoric, (b) literature, or (c) linguistics.
				✓ To enclose or explain abbreviations and acronyms	• The Modern Language Association (MLA) hosts a yearly convention.

Colon :	<ul> <li>✓ To introduce a list of items</li> </ul>	• Mary has three favorite ice cream flavors: chocolate, strawberry, and pistachio.	Semi-Colon ;	<ul> <li>✓ To indicate a connection between two complete sentences</li> </ul>	• Museums have an important purpose; they educate society.
				<ul> <li>✓ To clarify separation in lists with internal commas</li> </ul>	• I went to three cities last month: Las Vegas, Nevada; Seattle, Washington; and Orlando, Florida.



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
